

1. At its Third Regular Session of 2001, the Board asked to be regularly informed about emergency operations (EMOPs) approved jointly by the Executive Director (ED) and the Director-General (DG) of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) or under the delegated authority of the Executive Director. Since the Second Regular Session of 2002 this information has been provided twice a year.

- 2. This report covers EMOPs approved between 1 January and 30 June 2011, as shown in the attached tables. Table A lists projects with a food value of more than US\$3 million approved jointly by the Executive Director and the Director-General of FAO. Table B lists projects with a food value of less than US\$3 million approved by the Deputy Executive Director (DED) and Chief Operating Officer (COO) under the delegated authority of the Executive Director. Table C lists EMOPs with an individual value of US\$500,000 or less approved by regional directors or country directors (CDs) under the authority delegated to them by the Executive Director.
- 3. During the period under review, 19 EMOPs were approved: four by the Executive Director and the Director-General of FAO; seven under the delegated authority of the Deputy Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer, and eight by regional directors or country directors. These operations provided 377,159 mt of food assistance to 6 million people at a food cost of US\$174.5 million. The total costs to WFP were US\$286.6 million.

EMOPS APPROVED JOINTLY BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF FAO

- 4. **Sri Lanka EMOP 200239** began in February 2011 and ended in July 2011. It covered the food needs of 500,000 beneficiaries by distributing 11,950 mt of food, at a cost to WFP of US\$8.9 million. The EMOP provided food assistance to flood-affected populations in five of the most affected districts, through general food distributions, supplementary feeding and food-for-assets activities.
- 5. **Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) EMOP 200266** began in April 2011 and is scheduled to end in March 2012. With a total cost to WFP of US\$209.5 million, the EMOP covers the needs of more than 3.5 million beneficiaries, with a planned distribution of 310,532 mt. It aims to provide nutritional support to chronically undernourished children, women and other vulnerable groups, thereby stabilizing and reducing acute malnutrition; and to support the Government's strategy to reduce hunger and undernutrition by supporting the production of locally fortified food.
- 6. **North Africa Regional EMOP 200257** began in March 2011 for an initial three months. The regional operation provided food assistance to more than 1 million conflict-affected people in the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Tunisia and Egypt. It was launched in response to the urgent need for immediate support to the most vulnerable populations in these countries to address their food consumption gaps. The EMOP sought to save lives in emergencies, reduce food insecurity, and stabilize the nutrition status of residents, internally displaced persons (IDPs), returnees, refugees and other vulnerable groups. The initial cost to WFP was US\$39.2 million and the planned distribution was 35,166 mt. Subsequent budget revisions increased these figures to US\$100 million and 87,150 mt.



Côte d'Ivoire EMOP 200255 began in March 2011 and was expected to end in September 2011. The proposed cost to **WFP** was US\$16 million. 125,000 beneficiaries assisted and 9,879 mt of food distributed. Subsequent budget revisions mean that WFP will now distribute 26,862 mt to 628,000 people at a total cost of US\$39 million. The EMOP addresses the food needs of IDPs and people in host families in the western, central, northern and Abidjan regions, through general food distributions, and supports children with moderate acute malnutrition, pregnant and lactating women and malnourished anti-retroviral therapy patients, through supplementary feeding in areas affected by the crisis.

EMOPS Approved Under the Delegated Authority of the Deputy Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer

- 8. **Japan EMOP 200268** was an immediate-response operation launched in April 2011 in response to the needs of people affected by the earthquake and tsunami. At a total cost of US\$77,214, WFP distributed 50 mt of high-energy biscuits to 71,000 people over a period of two months.
- 9. **DPRK EMOP 200248** provided funding for a joint inter-agency assessment mission held in February–March 2011 at the Government's request, as harsh climatic conditions, including heavy rainfall and a severe winter, had led to crop losses and other damage. The mission carried out a thorough assessment of changes in the country's overall food security situation since the earlier crop and food security assessment mission of October–November 2010. The primary purpose was to assess the situation, indicate the changes and shocks, and provide recommendations for assistance to the most vulnerable groups, including women, children and the elderly in mountainous regions with high incidence of malnutrition. The total cost was US\$65,741.
- 10. **North Africa Regional EMOP 200254** was an immediate-response operation from February to May 2011 in preparation for a potential WFP response following conflict and unrest in the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Tunisia and Egypt. It entailed various emergency preparedness and contingency planning activities, such as inter-agency assessments and technical missions, to ensure a timely and effective emergency response in these countries. The total cost was US\$199,812.
- 11. **Togo EMOP 200195** began in February 2011 and was expected to end in September 2011. It targeted 6,000 beneficiaries, providing food assistance through general food distributions to refugees and the most vulnerable people among host families, and through food for work for host households during the lean season. Moderately malnourished children under 5 from both refugee and host communities received supplementary feeding rations until they recovered. The goals were to contribute to saving the lives of Ghanaian refugees in northern Togo and to ease the burden of the refugees on the host population. WFP distributed 660 mt of food valued at US\$602,903.
- 12. **Liberia EMOP 200225** began in February 2011 and ended in July 2011. It was designed to address the food needs of 60,000 refugees and food-insecure and vulnerable people within the host population, through general food distributions and supplementary feeding. The proposed cost to WFP was US\$7.9 million with food distributions of 6,082 mt. Following several budget revisions, these figures were revised to US\$31.9 million and 24,429 mt.



13. West Africa Regional EMOP 200258 was an immediate-response EMOP to enhance and strengthen WFP's preparedness to the high food price crisis in West Africa. The main components were risk analysis and identification of vulnerable groups, increasing capacity for the roll-out of cash- or voucher-based responses, and updating the Mauritania logistics capacity assessment. Activities focused on the most import-dependent countries of the West African coast, including the Gambia, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Liberia, Mauritania, and Senegal. The operation ran from March to May 2011, with a total cost to WFP of US\$193,142.

14. **Liberia EMOP 200270** was a preparedness activity from March to May 2011 in response to high food price shocks and the resulting vulnerability and food insecurity in Liberia. It focused on augmenting the capacity of the WFP country office to prepare for and respond to the impact of the high prices in a timely manner. It included a rapid urban food security review, review and preparation of response options, and exploration of possible expansion of ongoing school meal and livelihoods activities. The total cost to WFP was US\$199,450.

EMOPS Approved Under the Delegated Authority of Regional Directors or Country Directors

- 15. **Sri Lanka EMOP 200233** was an immediate-response EMOP from January to March 2011 to mitigate short-term food insecurity and help avoid deterioration in the nutrition status of flood-affected populations. It assisted 420,000 beneficiaries with 735 mt of food, at a total cost to WFP of US\$496,965.
- 16. **Philippines EMOP 200241** was an immediate-response EMOP launched in February 2011 for three months. WFP assisted more than 150,000 beneficiaries with 524 mt of food through one-off distributions, to meet and complement food and nutrition needs and to support the Government's quick turnaround of emergency response. The total cost was US\$500,000.
- 17. **Syrian Arab Republic EMOP 200279** was an immediate-response EMOP to provide immediate relief to populations affected by civil unrest in the country. Targeting 30,000 of the most affected people in Dara'a and other besieged areas, it provided 358 mt in one-month food rations, at a total cost to WFP of US\$499,857.
- 18. **Tunisia EMOP 200256** was an immediate-response EMOP for one month to assist people affected by the conflict and violence in the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya who were crossing the border into Tunisia. The operation involved mainly short-term distributions of 76 mt of high-energy biscuits to Tunisian and third country-national migrant workers, as well as Libyan refugees. WFP provided cash assistance to the Tunisian Red Cross to support wet feeding activities, and undertook emergency preparedness activities for additional assistance in the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya. The total number of beneficiaries was 50,000 and the total cost to WFP was US\$499,938.
- 19. **Libyan Arab Jamahiriya EMOP 200259** ran from March to June 2011. This immediate-response EMOP was launched to meet the immediate needs of 20,000 conflict-affected people in the eastern Libyan Arab Jamahiriya. WFP distributed 303 mt of food at a total cost of US\$499,328.
- 20. **Ghana EMOP 200278** was launched in April 2011 for three months in response to the influx of Ivorian refugees into Ghana following the electoral dispute and subsequent violence in Côte d'Ivoire. WFP distributed 500 mt of food to address the immediate food



needs of 10,000 Ivorian refugees and asylum seekers in two of the main camps. The total cost to WFP was US\$498,542.


- 21. **Namibia EMOP 200282** began in May 2011 and was scheduled to end in August 2011. The overall objective of the operation was to support Namibia's Directorate for Disaster Risk Management and regional disaster risk management committees in delivering life-saving food assistance to an estimated 100,000 flood-affected people in the seven most affected regions of northern and northeastern Namibia. WFP also provided technical assistance to national and regional disaster management authorities in food supply chain, warehouse and commodity management, to ensure the timely delivery of government assistance. The total cost to WFP was US\$149,234.
- 22. **Bolivia EMOP 200260** began in February 2011 for three months. This immediate-response EMOP aimed to support vulnerable populations affected by heavy floods. It assisted 35,000 people in 12 municipalities of the most affected departments of Cochabamba, La Paz and Beni, with 341 mt of food. Beneficiaries were indigenous families and subsistence farmers mostly living along the flooded rivers, and evacuated families living in camps or shelters. The cost was US\$483,987.

TREND ANALYSIS

23. The value of EMOPs approved by the Executive Director or under her delegated authority during the period covered by this report represents a 31 percent decrease in relation to the US\$417 million approved during the same period in 2010.
