

- 13.5 million people in need of humanitarian assistance inside Syria
- 8.7 million people cannot survive without food assistance
- 3 in 4 people inside Syria live in poverty
- 4.8 million registered Syrian refugees, in:

Turkey	2.7 million
Lebanon	1.0 million
Jordan	0.6 million
Iraq	0.2 million
Egypt	0.1 million

6.5 million people internally displaced



Jordan: Support to emergency vaccinations coordinated with multiple agencies

Turkey: Cash-based Intervention Technical Working Group

Lebanon: Strategic Review of Food and Nutrition Security completed with Government of Lebano

CONTEXTUAL RISKS:

- •Clashes between military forces and ISIL affecting security situation
- Limited access for delivery of humanitarian aid throughout Syria
- •Insecurity across the region including recent terrorism attacks in Turkey.
- •Tensions between host communities and Syrians in neighbouring countries (pressure on host economies)

PROGRAMMATIC RISKS:

- •Funding shortfalls hindering achievement of programmatic objectives
- •Displacement affecting ability to accommodate affected populations within existing camps and infrastructure
- •Diminishing purchasing power in host communities leading to food insecurity (Egypt, Jordan)

INSTITUTIONAL RISKS:

- Maintaining perception as neu and independent humanitarian actor
- Availability of corporate capacin areas such as cash-based transfers, monitoring or AAP in times of multiple emergencies
- Risk to staff safety




