Key issues emerging from the WHS process

- Complementarity between humanitarian and development assistance
- Localization of response
- Differentiation between sudden-onset natural disasters and complex protracted emergencies
- Increased use of cash-base assistance
- Greater effectiveness and transparency

WHS Synthesis Report: Emerging Vision for WHS

*'A world whose fundamental humanity is restored. A world where no one confronted by crisis dies unnecessarily, **goes hungry**, is victimised by conflict, or left behind or in despair, because we lacked the political will and resources to help them.'*

WHS Synthesis Report: Five Action Areas

Dignity: People at the centre of humanitarian action, increased cash-based assistance, and accountability to affected people

Safety: Protection and International Humanitarian Law

Resilience: Protracted crises, bridging the humanitarian-development gap, DRR, social protection, refugee hosting deal, durable solutions

Partnerships: Humanitarian principles, localization, subsidiarity, and innovation

Finance: Closing the funding gap, transaction costs, direct funding to local organizations.

WFP Position Paper: Three key priorities

- Enhance complementarity between humanitarian and development assistance
- Safeguard the foundations of humanitarian action
- Better serve people in need

WFP Recommendations on Humanitarian Financing

- Reinvigorate GHD principles
- Expand contingent financing mechanisms for natural disasters
- Shift towards multi-year planning and funding for protracted crises
- Redefine parameters for usage of development funding in protracted crises
