

Operations in 2011

- Provided emergency food assistance to some 2.4 million beneficiaries as follows:
 - ✓ emergency food assistance and blanket nutritional support to 500,000 IDPs and conflict-affected persons (south/north);
 - ✓ Emergency Safety Nets to 1.3 million severely food insecure persons;
 - ✓ Cash transfers (pilot) to ESN food beneficiaries targeting 70,000 beneficiaries
 - ✓ Targeted and blanket supplementary rations for 120,000 children aged 6 59 months and nursing mothers;
 - √ Food and nutritional assistance to Somali refugees;
 - ✓ Support to 59,000 girls receiving family take home rations
- ➤ Air transport and fuel facility services for the humanitarian community in Yemen




Operational Strategy for 2012


- WFP's operational strategy for 2012 is well positioned to respond to the developing humanitarian situation in Yemen.
- Based on the current humanitarian context and operating environment in Yemen, irrespective of how the current political crisis evolves, WFP will be assisting assist 3.2 million persons (approximately 13 percent of Yemen's population) - represents a 35% percent increase from 2011
- A **nationwide EMOP**, to provide emergency food and nutritional assistance to 540,000 IDPs, returnees and war-affected persons in both northern and southern Yemen

Operational Strategy for 2012

• A **nationwide PRRO** providing food and nutritional support to non-displaced vulnerable communities. WFP would provide a seasonal emergency safety net (ESN) targeting 1.8 million severely food insecure persons, and a nutritional component with both preventive (blanket) and curative (targeted) activities assisting 634,500 MAM beneficiaries.

In addition to CO Sana'a, WFP maintains field offices in:

 Haradh (Hajjah), Amran, Hodeidah and Sa'adah in northern Yemen, and Aden in southern Yemen

Key operational constraints

Security

- ➤ Increasing political unrest causing violence and insecurity more areas of the country
- ➤ Disruption of operations due to:
 - > Staff ceiling
 - > Access
 - > Capacity impact

Economic Crisis

- ➤ Volatile commodity prices
- > Fuel shortages
