

ODK

 Burundi, Democratic Republic of Congo, Djibouti, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Republic of Congo, Rwanda, Somalia, Tanzania, and Uganda

 2006: 22.6 million beneficiaries and almost 1.5 million MT

2007: planned over 20 million beneficiaries and about 420,000 MT delivered so far

FOOD SECURITY

More than 50 million food insecure and vulnerable

- Low Human Development Index
- Droughts: at least 10 over 35 years
- Insecurity

FOOD SECURITY IN THE HORN OF AFRICA

- Ethiopia: 31 million below the poverty line
- Somalia: up to 20% global acute malnutrition
- Kenya: 3 million food insecure
- Uganda: 42% of rural population below poverty line
- Eritrea: 40% of children under 5 underweight
- Djibouti: up to 70,000 pastoralists may need food assistance

FOOD SECURITY IN THE HORN OF AFRICA

- About 25 million pastoralists and agro-pastoralists in the HOA
- In Kenya, 80% of population in arid districts live below poverty line
- in Uganda, WFP is distributing food to 500,000 pastoralists



FOOD SECURITY IN THE GREAT LAKES

 Burundi only 16% of population food secure 89% live on less than US\$2/day up to 400,000 MT annual food deficit

• Rwanda 28% percent food insecure

 Tanzania Up to 53% medium to high chronic malnutrition

CHALLENGES

Somalia –Risk of flood in the south, volatile security, extremely high malnutrition

Northern Uganda - peace talks ongoing

Eastern DRC - An estimated 260,000 people have been displaced over the last six months due to continuing clashes between militias and Government forces

Regional - isolated flooding and recurring drought



MARKETS

Purchase From Farmer Groups – Uganda

- Supports the Plan for Modernisation of Agriculture and encourages production
- Improves marketing possibilities for farmers, boosts local production, competitiveness and household incomes
- Assist small scale farmer groups to sell directly to WFP at competitive prices up to 10% of the total food commodities purchased locally

Emergency-level malnutrition rate > 15% **Deteriorating shelter &** infrastructure, including roads Continued influx from Somalia Outbreaks of diseases Gender gap in schools Limited life skills training
