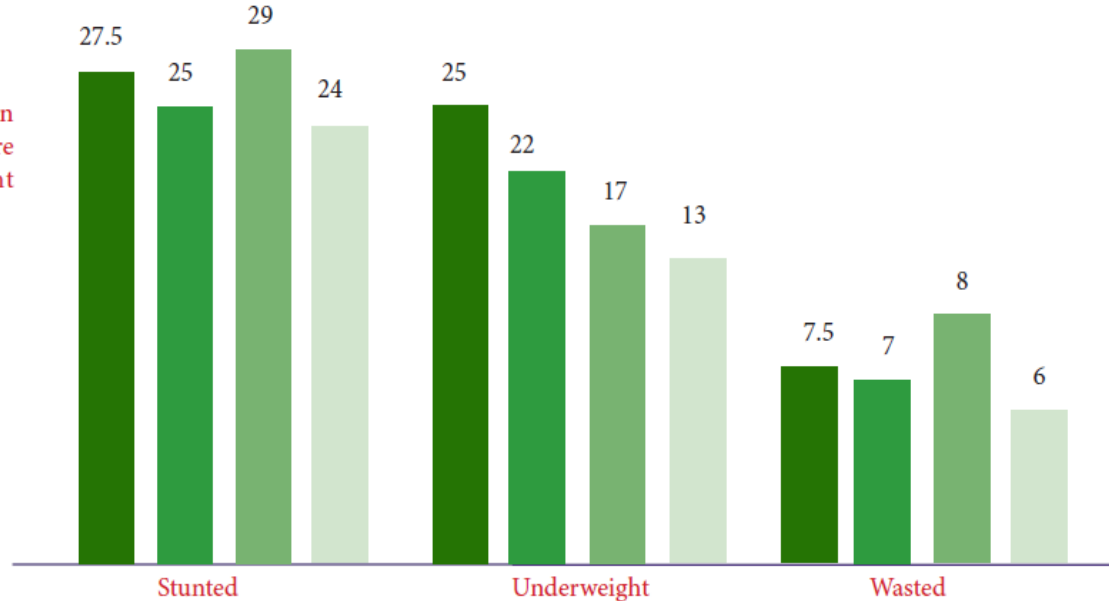

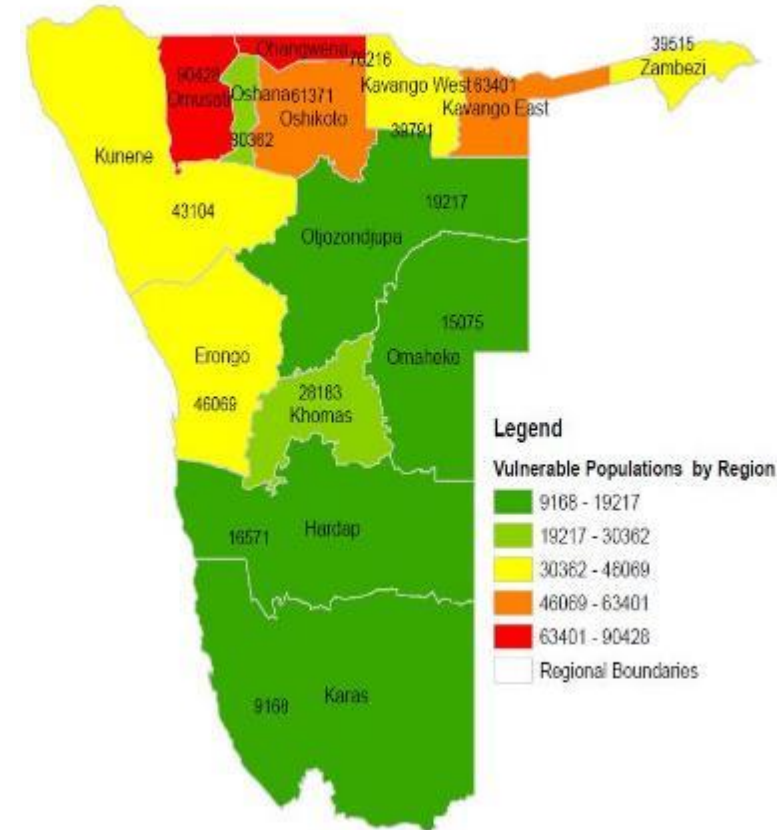
Namibia – Persistent Hunger & Undernutrition

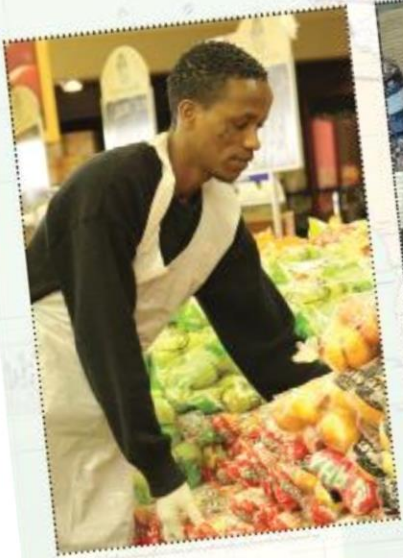
