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## ABSTRACT

- 1. Protracted relief and recovery operation (PRRO) 10053.2 was approved in April 2007 for the period 1 July 2007 31 December 2008 to assist 110,000 beneficiaries with 11,965 mt of food. The operational budget is US\$6.69 million.
- 2. The 18-month PRRO, the last phase of WFP's intervention in Armenia, includes a gradual hand-over to the Government to ensure continued and sustainable support for vulnerable groups.
- 3. The operation envisages a phase-out of relief food assistance in parallel with an increased Government budget in the existing Family Poverty Benefit (FPB) programme. The Government has budgeted for a public cash-for-work scheme. Communities in rural areas are engaged in primary school feeding and are providing complementary resources in support of school feeding. WFP focuses its food for education (FFE) on areas where community commitment and resources are available as activities are handed over.
- 4. The goals of WFP's assistance are to support the most vulnerable and food-insecure people during transition and by the end of 2008 to have handed over the WFP relief caseload to the Government, which will assist the beneficiaries by increasing family benefits. WFP continues to focus on household food security, the creation of community assets and the development of human capital by:
  - enhancing the food security of targeted populations Strategic Objective 2; Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) 1 and 6;
  - rehabilitating agricultural and rural infrastructure Strategic Objective 2; MDGs 1 and 7;
  - alleviating short-term hunger, improving concentration and learning among schoolchildren and maintaining high attendance rates – Strategic Objective 4; MDGs 2 and 3;
  - ➢ increasing HIV/AIDS awareness − Strategic Objective 4 and MDG 6;
  - promoting self-reliance, especially among women, by imparting knowledge about micro-enterprise development and agricultural techniques – Strategic Objective 4 and MDG 3; and
  - enhancing the capacities of the Government and local partners to absorb WFP's caseload Strategic Objective 5.
- 5. WFP activities include:
  - relief food assistance to supplement the FPB;
  - food for work for the repair of infrastructure;
  - food for training to promote self-reliance in vulnerable villages and provincial towns where opportunities for improvement are few; and
  - FFE complemented by fresh products with transport provided by communities and the involvement of parents' associations.
- 6. WFP has an ongoing dialogue with the Government: discussions with the Ministry of Labour and Social Issues showed that the Government would benefit from guidance to build capacity in maintaining food stocks for emergencies; the ministry indicated that if the Government opts to use a food-based safety net in its new Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (PRSRP), it would like WFP to help with planning and implementation arrangements.
