



PSEAH Strategy 2026-29

This Strategy articulates WFP's vision of **a safe and accountable operational environment** in which all forms of sexual misconduct are **systematically prevented, swiftly addressed through response and accountability** and never tolerated, and where **the rights, wishes, needs, safety, dignity and well-being of victims/survivors are always at the center of all actions.**



PSEAH Strategy 2026-29: Implementation Plan


2026 PRIORITY ACTIONS BY OBJECTIVE

1 Enhanced prevention and mitigation of SEAH risks, particularly in high-risk contexts and operations.

- Global/country level analysis of CO PSEA Self-Assessment Results
- Strengthening deployment of PSEA in emergency contexts
- Targeted Sexual Misconduct training for leadership and staff
- Empowering PSEA Focal Points at country level
- Sexual misconduct policy 2026-2027 (JIU)
- Enhanced vetting processes (MDS) 2026-2027

2 Increased access to safe, trusted and victim/survivor-centered reporting channels for sexual misconduct concerns.

- Launch of PSEA Awareness Campaign with UNHAS



PSEAH Strategy 2026-29: Implementation Plan


2026 PRIORITY ACTIONS BY OBJECTIVE

3 Improved victim/survivor-centered response, encompassing investigations, support and accountability mechanisms.

- PSEA and Partnerships
- Development and roll out practical guidance for victim/survivor assistance
- Clearer criteria for disciplinary action and protective measures
- Enhanced engagement with victims during the disciplinary process

4 Enhanced, system-wide progress on PSEAH across the humanitarian sector driven by proactive and effective leadership.

- Leadership and maintained active participation in interagency efforts.



IASC PSEAH Championship 2024-2025: Key Achievements



Operationalizing a victim/survivor-centered approach
