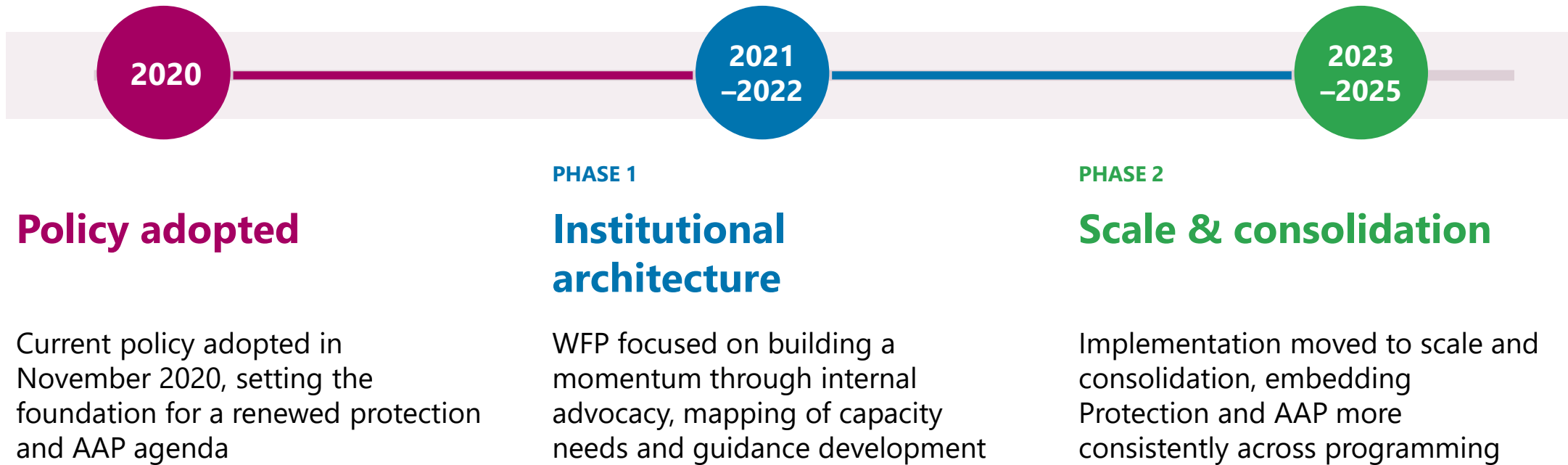

5-Year Transformation



WFP's protection and AAP agenda matured from policy foundation to institution-wide operating practice.

Key Achievements

1. Protection & AAP are embedded as corporate priorities in WFP

- Broadly recognised as non-negotiable elements of WFP's work
- Integrated in Strategic Plan 2022-2025 and 2026-2029
- Mandatory corporate level indicators
- Embedded in other corporate processes and frameworks

2. Stronger integration in planning and programming

- Programmes designed with better understanding of risks, and how protection risks and food insecurity interact
- Scaling up of integrated context analysis and risk assessments



Key Achievements

4. Expanded systems for accountability to affected people

- Rapid scale-up of Community Engagement Action Plans
- Digitalisation and standardization of Community Feedback Mechanisms
- Enhanced use of community insights for programme adaptation and learning

5. Significant investments in capacity strengthening and staffing

- Expanded staffing
- People-centred approaches training roll-out
- Strengthened engagement with cooperating partners

6. Strengthened partnerships and inter-agency leadership

- Strengthened collaboration with specialized protection actors and UN partners
- Shaping interagency standards and strategy on Centrality of Protection and Collective CFMs
- Increasing inter-agency CFM engagement and emerging leadership as CFM service providers

Provision of complementary expertise via secondees



Increased system-wide momentum on the Centrality of Protection

Key challenges and risks

- Internal funding constraints
- High staff turnover
- Uneven implementation at CO level
- Broader system pressures, leading to heightened protection risks

Conclusions and way ahead

Future progress will hinge on:

- Predictable and flexible multi-year funding
- Continued investments in staffing and capacity strengthening
- Continued integration of protection and AAP across all programming areas

A **policy evaluation planned for 2027** will offer further insights and recommendations.



Funding cuts are reshaping the humanitarian sector

Global funding reductions are triggering significant, system-wide changes.



- A shift toward **minimal, survival-oriented programming** – diminishing focus on proactive risk reduction, preventive interventions, stabilization and recovery
- Assistance increasingly excluding areas with **crisis-level food insecurity**
- Increased reliance on remote monitoring **limits the ability to account for multidimensional vulnerability**
- **Staffing, field presence, monitoring and partner capacity** are reduced

The impact of funding cuts in WFP

Key operational shifts:

- '**Hyperprioritisation**' and focus on IPC 4 and 5
- Large-scale reduction in **assistance coverage**
- Reduction in **value of assistance** delivered
- Reductions in **operational capacity and staffing** - weakening protection capacities, community engagement and community feedback mechanisms



Reduced assistance is increasing exposure to harm

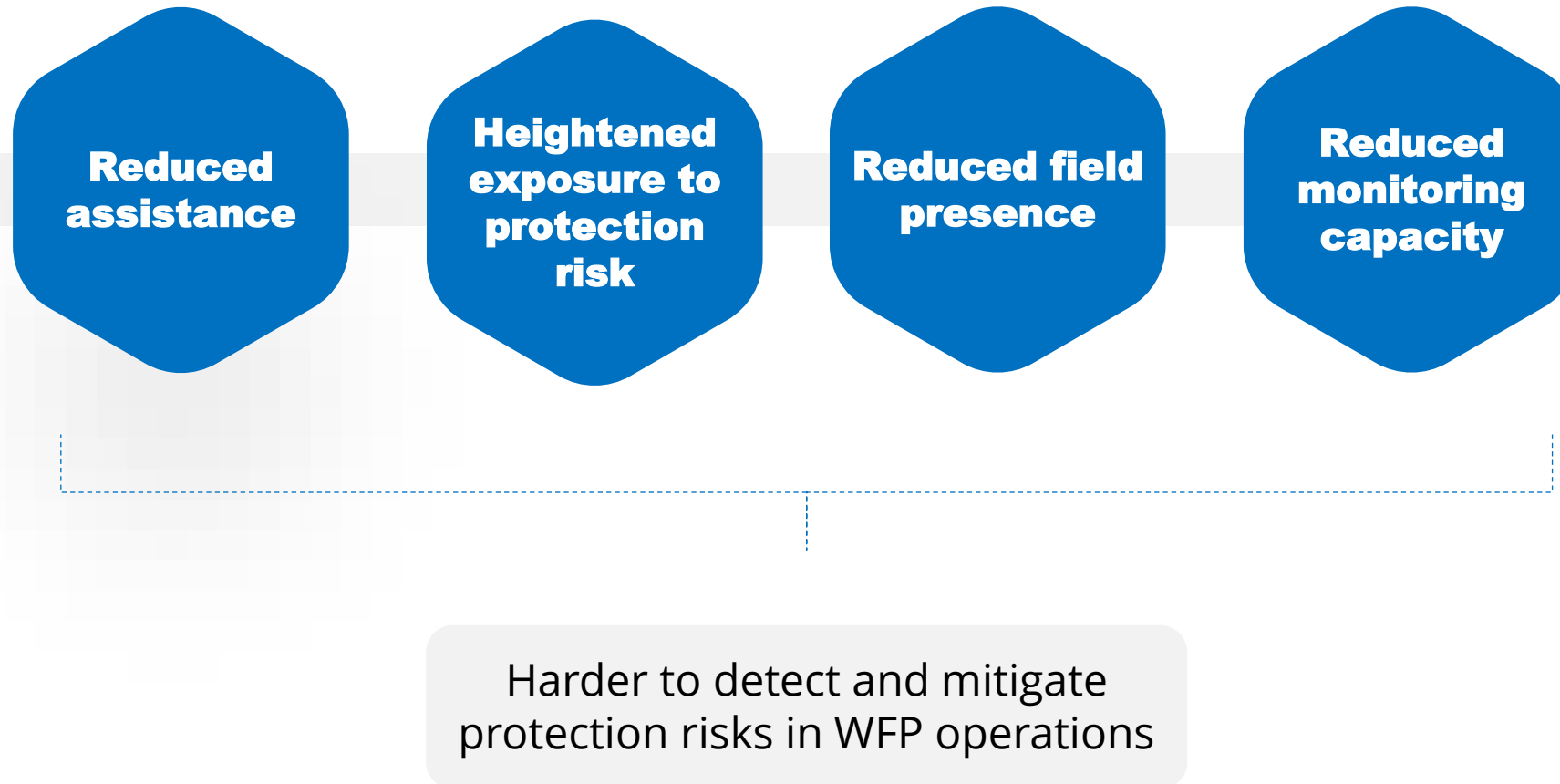
Important changes to the protection landscape

- Households are adopting **more severe coping strategies**, including harmful and irreversible survival strategies, such as gender-based violence, child labour, early marriage, and unsafe migration
- Some individuals are **at higher risk of earlier, deeper, and more prolonged impacts**, due to structural inequalities, reduced coping capacity, and reliance on services that are being withdrawn
- Reduced availability of **specialised protection services**, affecting response and hindering referrals
- As monitoring and CFM capacities and field presence contract, many individuals and the risks they face may **remain invisible**

Further indirect impact

- Increased social tension and breakdowns in social cohesion at community level
- Erosion of trust in humanitarian actors

Protection risks are rising while mitigation capacity is weakening



How protection and AAP continue to inform our work

- **Document changes** at field level
- Listen to affected people to inform prioritisation decisions and **communicate transparently** about changes in assistance
- Ensure **programme adjustments** are informed by protection risk assessments and community feedback, not only food security severity thresholds or operational efficiency considerations
- Provide **guidance and hands-on support to country offices** on how to maintain minimum standards across operations, including safe access, community engagement and community feedback mechanisms

Protection context in the Rohingya refugee response

Context:

- 1.2 million refugees, including approximately 150,000 new arrivals since 2024
- Security incidents, including killings, abductions, forced recruitment and GBV
- Reduced funding for humanitarian response including protection services
- Severe livelihood constraints, with no legal opportunities for employment

Food insecurity:

- Protracted crisis – blanket assistance for over 9 years
- Differentiated needs – some households have increased self-reliance, while others have deepened dependence on humanitarian assistance
- Households with adolescents, persons with disabilities, young or minor children, and elderly members face higher risks (REVA 9)
- Targeting and Prioritization Exercise (TPE): Needs-based exercise to ensure that the most food insecure are supported.

Integrating protection and AAP in Targeting and Prioritisation

Community consultations and targeting criteria

- Community consultations on household needs and ranking vulnerability
- Protection and AAP team contribute directly to targeting decisions

Sensitisation and community engagement

- Simplified complex needs based targeting model into messages in 3 languages & sensitization across multiple channels tailored to different community groups
- More than 7,000 trained Rohingya volunteers served as frontline communicators, leading sensitization and community engagement efforts

Community Feedback Mechanism

- Coordinated Helpdesk in collaboration with UNHCR at WFP outlets
- Led to improvement of UNHCR Registration data and programmatic changes

Post-distribution monitoring

- Protection considerations integrated in PDM



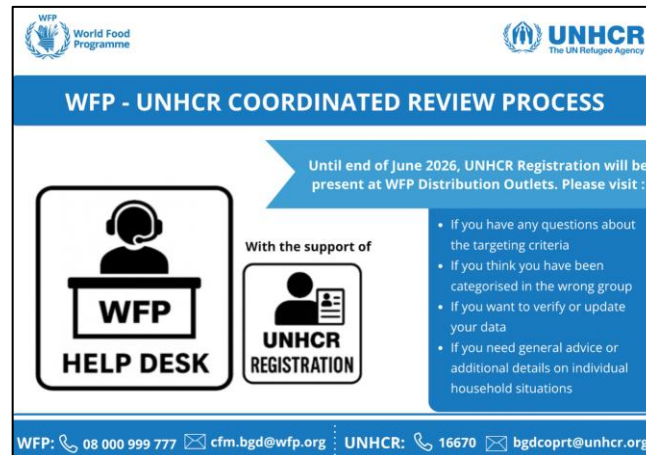
Building Community Acceptance: Results and Take-aways

Community acceptance

- CFM cases: 29,000 in April | 17,000 in May | 12,000 in June
- Initial resistance but quick acceptance thanks to sensitisation and engagement with local government and community leaders

Take-aways

- Participation improves programme quality
- Transparency builds acceptance
- Community-led engagement matters
- Protection and accountability are not separate from food assistance programming

Protection risks driving food insecurity in Sudan

- Sudan is now the largest humanitarian crisis in the world
- 19.5 million people are facing severe hunger, with 14 'famine risk' hotspots
- Hunger in Sudan is driven by protection risks:
 - **Limited food AVAILABILITY:**
 - critical food system infrastructure has been destroyed/damaged in attacks
 - insecurity, mass forced displacement, UXO contamination mean fields are abandoned
 - **Restricted ACCESS to food:**
 - restrictions on free movement of people and goods, including siege
 - intensified local inter-tribal violence and discrimination, including hate speech
 - loss of livelihoods and exhaustion of assets
 - Physical and mental health impacts of violence

Mitigating the protection risks driving hunger

MAINSTREAMING protection:

- Capturing *community* perceptions of violence and how it can be addressed
- Enforcing mandatory PSEA requirements across staff and partners
- Improving safe referrals for survivors' access to specialist support
- Learning exchange and capacity strengthening across FSL Cluster
- Embedding protection and conflict-sensitivity data in operational planning, assessments and monitoring

INTEGRATING protection:

- Explicitly targeting assistance to reduce acute protection threats
- Leveraging cash assistance to enhance pathways to socio-economic rights
- Contributing analysis and capacities to progress the HCT's Action Plan on the Centrality of Protection

ADVOCACY on protection:

- Contributing to the evidence base for HCT advocacy with conflict parties
- Mapping the links between protections risks and food insecurity

Consequences of funding shortfalls

- **Needs far outpace resources - WFP can only plan to support 1 in 5 people** – 4 million people prioritized out of 19.5 million in need of emergency food assistance
- **Of the total USD 656 million required** over the next 6 months, a minimum of USD 324 million is urgently required to sustain the current level of operations and prevent further cuts in assistance.
- **Pausing emergency food assistance** for vulnerable people **will likely:**
 - **Escalate hunger**
 - **Increase exposure to violence, exploitation and abuse** including:
 - High-risk movements across conflict frontlines; to/through EO contaminated areas
 - Survival sex, exploitative labour, early marriage
 - Further forced displacement
 - Forced recruitment, including of children, into armed groups
 - Intensified inter-communal conflict
- The **impact of this violence is NOT temporary** – physical and psychological trauma undermines resilience, productive capacities, and prospects for peace
