ABSTRACT

WFP has provided emergency assistance, in collaboration with UNHCR and the Government of Djibouti, to Ethiopian and Somali refugees in Djibouti since 1989. The flows of refugees across the borders to Djibouti were caused by civil conflict, and the ensuing economic and political instability, in Ethiopia and Somalia.

Nearly 21,000 Somali refugees and 1,000 Ethiopian refugees reside in three camps in Djibouti. The overall situation in Somalia, although improving, still remains largely unfavourable for repatriation. It is therefore unlikely that Somali refugees will be repatriated before mid–2000. Consequently, the PRRO has a duration of eighteen months, until the end of May 2000.

The principal objective is to provide refugees with the basic food required for survival until they are repatriated. A secondary objective is to encourage refugees to settle in camps where they can benefit from education, health and vocational training activities.

In addition to the provision of a general ration, a therapeutic feeding programme is being implemented for expectant mothers and the disabled. To reduce the student drop-out rate, particularly among girls, monthly take-home rations of sugar are offered to those students who have regularly attended school during the month. Efforts are being made to carry out sensitization campaigns on the importance of increasing the attendance of girls at primary schools.

WFP encourages the participation of refugee women in food management and distribution. Currently, some 50 percent of refugees involved in food management are women.
