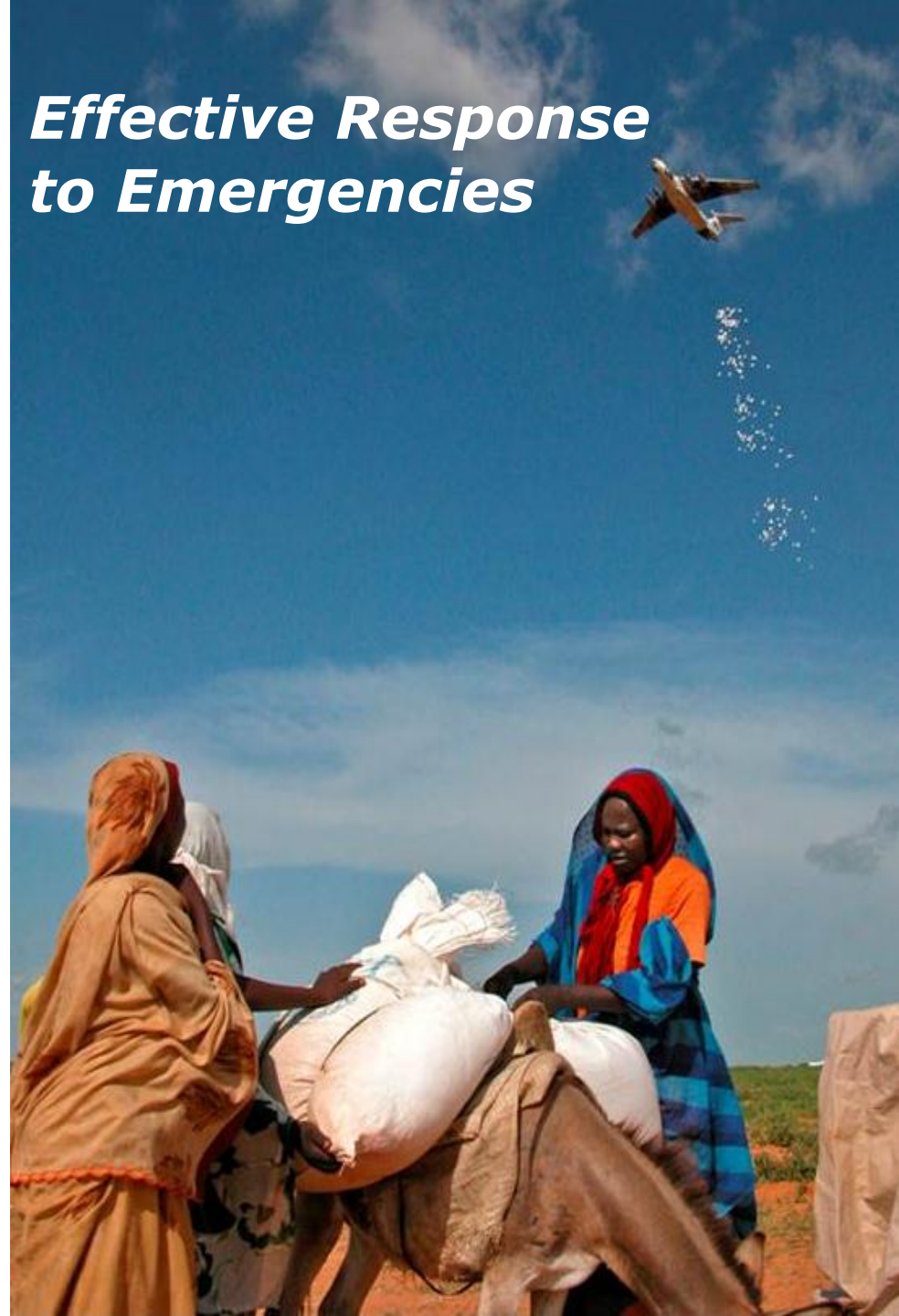

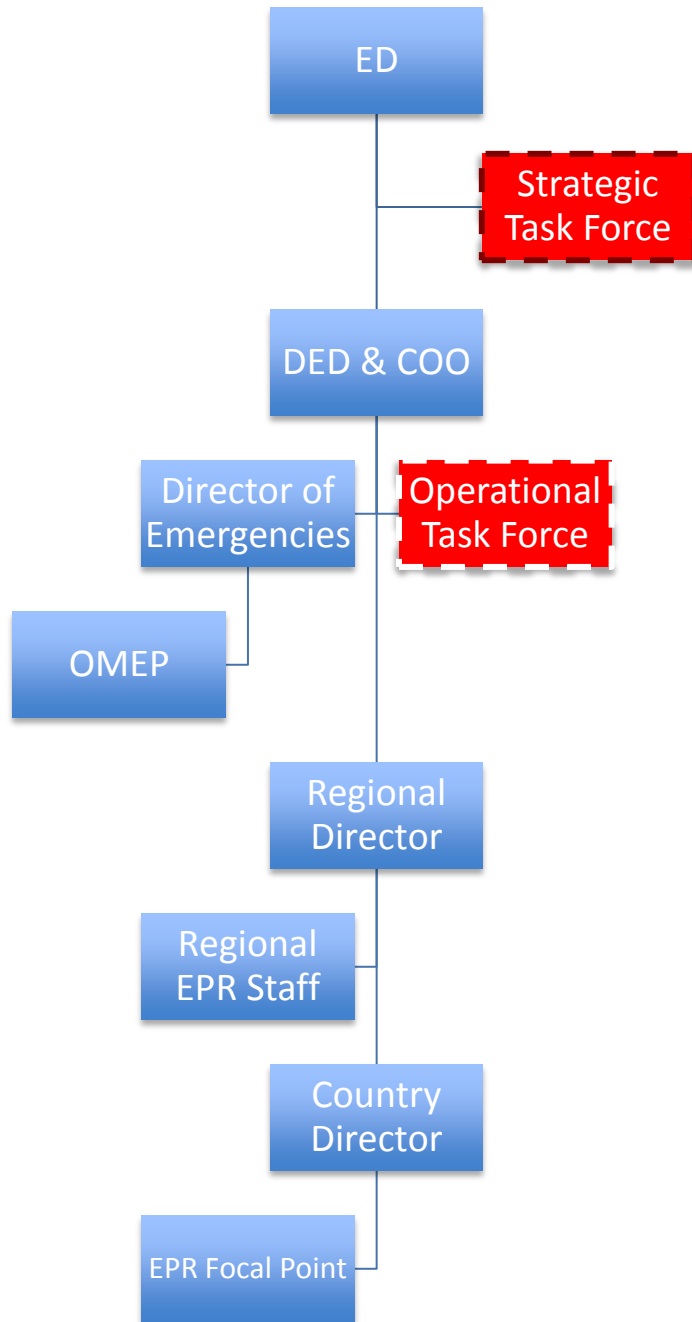
WFP's Core Function:

OME's Emergency Preparedness and Response Branch (OMEPR)

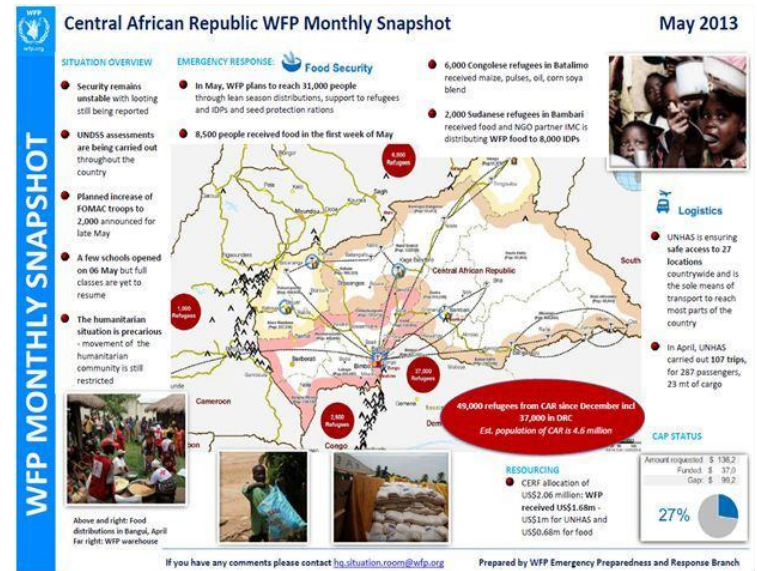
- What is happening?

Operational Information Management Unit

- What has and is happening and, ideally, why?
- Seven day horizon
- Daily, weekly and monthly updates
- Immediate alerting
- Updates to Executive Board
- Supports response coordination
- Links to wide range of partners and sources

- OCHA
- UNOCC
- EU, etc



Analysis and Early Warning Unit

- What might happen and why?
- Layered approach
 - Risk Index
 - Biannual
 - Monthly
 - Ad hoc
- Heavy partnership networking and leadership
- Meteorological expertise



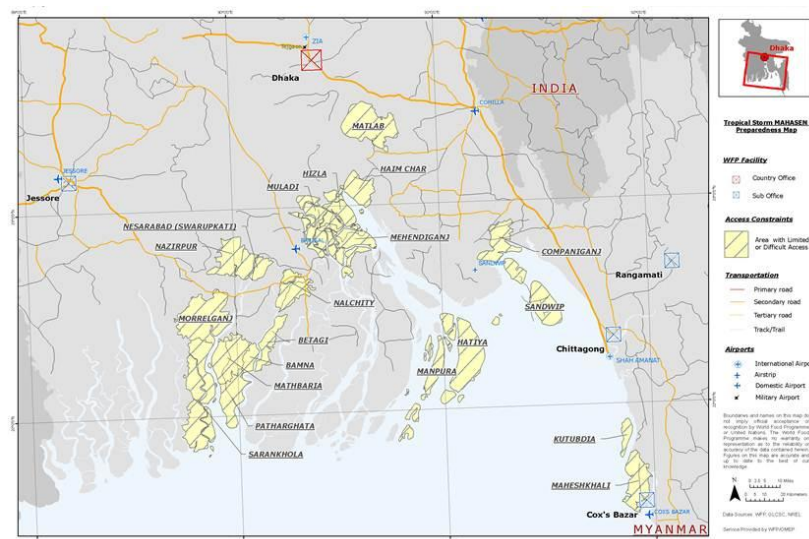
Operational Readiness Management Unit

- How ready are we?
- Manages the Emergency Preparedness & Response Package:
 - Risk Analysis and Monitoring
 - Minimum Preparedness Actions
 - Emergency Readiness Actions
 - SOPs for Initial Response
- Simulation
- Interagency engagement



Geo-Spatial Support Unit

- Digital and paper maps:
 - Analysis, early warning & planning
 - Operational situation awareness
 - Maps for messaging
- Geo database management
- Deployment and training
- Partnerships – mapping and satellite imagery, e.g.:
 - UNOSAT
 - EU
 - US State Department

Preparedness and Response Enhancement Programme (PREP)

The Three Objectives of PREP

➤ Objective 1 (Capacities):

To strengthen WFP corporate response capacities to support emergency response for up to 6 million beneficiaries.

Focus Areas:

- Food: FPF (RUSF); Ready-To-Eat-Strategy
- Funds: Advanced Finance Review
- Non-Food Items: Corporate Response Stock Establishment
- Human Resources: Consolidate Functional Emergency Response Rosters and Related Training
- Logistics: Air (Rotary); Truck Fleet; & Boats
- Information: Operational Information Management

Preparedness and Response Enhancement Programme (PREP)

➤ Objective 2 (Abilities):

To strengthen the accountability and coherence of WFP's response management

Focus Areas:

- Normative Guidance:
 - Emergency Preparedness and Response Framework
 - Revised Activation Protocol
 - Functional Area SOPs and Related Delegations
- Risk Management: Emergency Preparedness and Response Package (EPRP)
- Tools: Corporate Response EMOP Facility
- Testing: Corporate Response Exercises

Preparedness and Response Enhancement Programme (PREP)

➤ Objective 3 (Partnerships):

To strengthen partnerships with national authorities, the international humanitarian community and other humanitarian actors for a more effective humanitarian response.

Focus Areas:

- National Disaster Management Authority Engagement (CAPRO)
- Inter-Agency Standing Committee's Transformative Agenda
- Humanitarian Common Services (UNHRD, UNHAS, Base Camps)
- Other Non-Governmental Partnerships For Emergency Preparedness: INGO/Local Civil Society; National Red Crescent/Red Crescent Societies; Private Sector; and Civil-Military

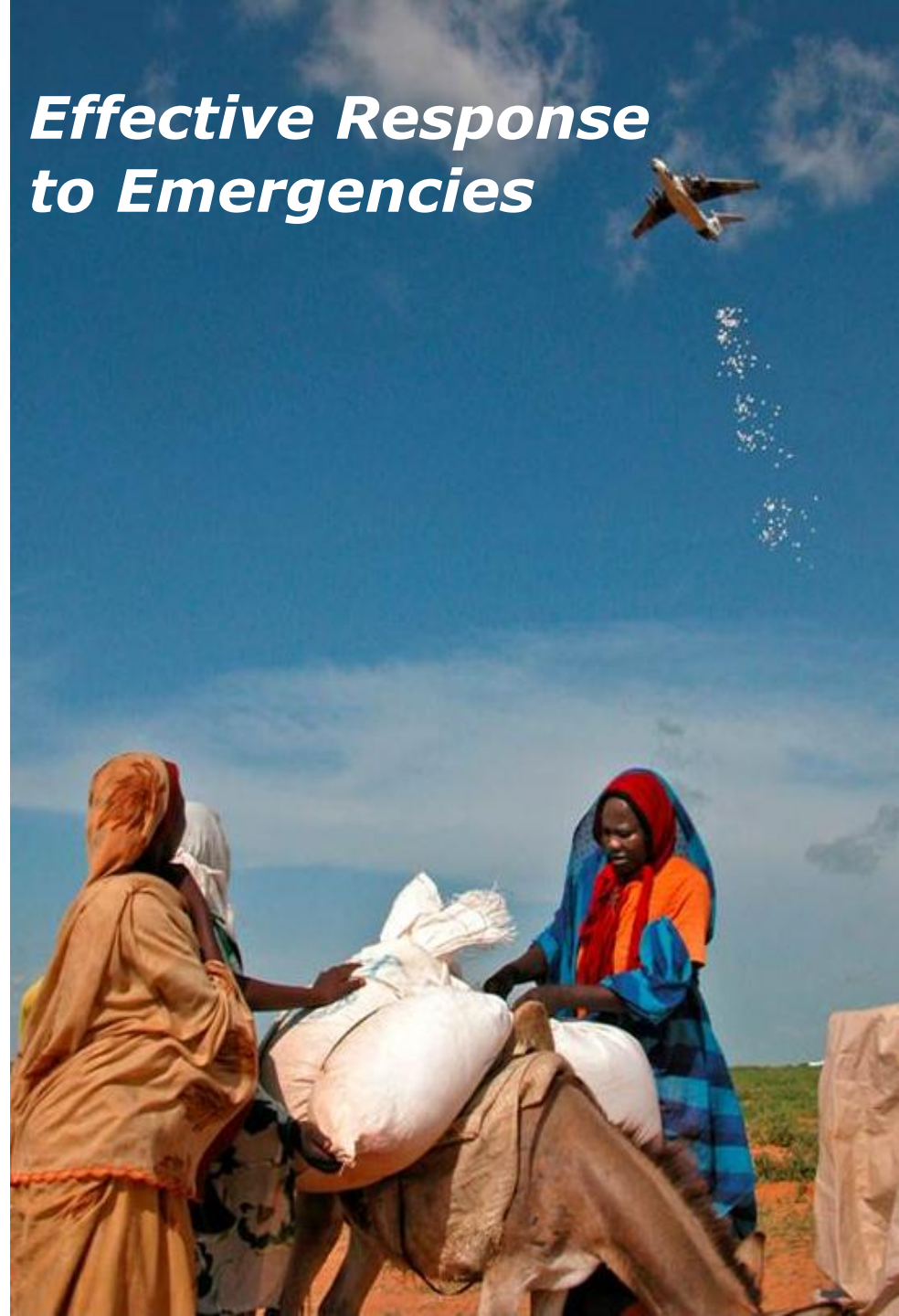
Joint UNICEF – WFP Preparedness Programme

- Significant investment from UK for 2014
- Directly related to leadership in IASC preparedness
- Multiple countries
- Capture value of preparedness in three dimensions
 - Timeliness
 - Appropriateness
 - Cost effectiveness
- Outputs in three elements
 - WFP/UNICEF preparedness to respond
 - WFP/UNICEF ability to contribute to partners
 - Model on value
