



#### NUMBER OF PEOPLE NOT REACHED IN 2008







WFP Sudan needs to secure about 65% of its requirement now to fill the pipeline for distribution and prepositioning in early 2009

WFP Sudan needs more than \$200 million just to meet immediate needs

WFP Sudan has already borrowed \$53 million internally from IRA and WCF

### WFP HUMANITARIAN AIR SERVICE

SERVING THE HUMANITARIAN COMMUNITY IN SUDAN





### **US\$89** million required in 2009

More than 88% of UNHAS requirement is for aircraft contracts and fuel which has both seen a sharp increase this year

WFP's largest air operation serving 315 agencies flying to over 188 locations in Sudan

Monthly average of 14,000 passengers per month

UNHAS still faces a critical shortfall of US\$9 million to continue services in 2008
