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#### A complex emergency...issues at hand



#### 1. Heavily militarized context

- Use military escorts as a last resort to deliver humanitarian assistance
- ☐ IDPs concentration areas with increased military presence.

#### 2. Protection Crisis

- ☐ Displacement key crisis factor
- ☐ Civilians facing serious human rights violations and abuses
- Protection dimensions at core of the response

#### 3. Food & Nutrition Crisis

- Protracted, subsequent and new displacement
- Alarming acute food and nutrition situation
- Market largely disrupted
- Naira depreciation, inflation affect HHs foodsec

#### 4. WASH and Health Crisis

- Critical health conditions
- ☐ High morbidity and mortality rates
- Lack of basic adequate shelter, water, latrines
- ☐ Risks of diseases affecting particularly, children

#### 5. Education crisis

- NE Nigeria had lowest E & A rates before the crisis
- ☐ Estimated 3 mn conflict affected children with no access to education.
- Education infrastructure

# 6. Limited scope for safe, voluntary and sustainable returns of IDPs

- Return process
- Relocation plans
- New displacement
- ☐ Lack of basic services





#### **◎ ※** General Food Distributions

Prevention of malnutrition, targeting children aged 6-59 months and nursing mothers in Nigeria, and children 6-23 months in Cameroon, Chad and Niger.



#### **School Feeding**

Taking place in Cameroon, Chad and Niger but under different countries operations (funding issues).



#### **Food assistance for Asset**

In Nigeria, Cameroon and Niger, targeting both displaced and host populations
