Outputs

WFP's direct contribution based on its comparative advantage

1.1 Food insecure and crisis-affected populations have access to nutritious food and cash-based assistance, restored assets and services to meet their urgent needs

1.2 Crisis-affected children, pregnant women and girls and new mothers, and other nutritionally vulnerable populations benefit from programmes to prevent and treat malnutrition and improve diets

Protection and Accountability to Affected Populations

- **Protection:** 1 new indicator on Disability Inclusion (accessibility).
- **Accountability:** 1 revised indicator and 2 new indicators on PSEA
- **6 indicators show disability inclusiveness** across programmatic and management areas



Gender Equality & Women's Empowerment

- No change on cross-cutting indicators
- Some programmatic indicators amended to include references to data disaggregation by sex
- Indicators to be formulated following the Gender Policy



Nutrition Integration

- Slight revision of the indicator on nutrition sensitive packages for clarity
- Additional indicator to measure WFP's effectiveness in meeting diverse nutritional needs across both nutrition specific and nutrition sensitive programmes



Environmental Sustainability

- Based on the ESSF
- Highlighted **8 WFP Environmental and Social Standards** based on a 'do no harm approach'
- New indicators being tested in 2022 – include **conflict sensitivity**

Key updates since Second Informal Consultation on the CRF

- **60 total indicators** (16 KPIs from CRF 2017-2021)
- **MR2: Workplace culture** has been strengthened in the narrative as well as new indicators **for people management practices, prevention of abuse of authority and PSEA**
- **MR5:** New indicators on **knowledge management, evidence** and **data disaggregation**
