

CSP strategic direction: investing in strategic partnerships to enhance the effectiveness of humanitarian interventions

- **focus on filling prioritized gaps drawing on WFP's comparative advantage** in supporting refugees, emergency preparedness and response, institutional capacity strengthening, and service provision
- **leverage the complementary strengths** of WFP and Türkiye to enhance global emergency response efforts working toward the shared goal of addressing global food insecurity
- **pave the way for WFP's responsible programmatic exit** post-2028 and an alternative presence in Türkiye



Focus and alignment: refugee response, capacity strengthening and service provision in line with national and UN priorities

- **Duration: 3 years** (2026-2028)
- **Budget: USD 51.6 million**
(~17.2 million per year)
- **Reach: 52,500** unique direct beneficiaries



Sustainability and transition: WFP in Türkiye post-2028

- **Phase-out** of WFP's support to declining in-camp refugee population will be carefully planned with authorities
- **Strengthened local and private sector** capacities in emergency preparedness and response facilitating WFP's programmatic exit
- **Continued strategic collaboration** between WFP and Türkiye post-CSP in addressing global humanitarian challenges
- WFP's global food procurement and supply chain footprint as entry point for positioning WFP's presence in Türkiye through a **regional humanitarian and supply chain hub**

- 1.2. Crisis-affected people receive assistance to meet their basic food requirements and other essential needs (Tier 1).

Activity

- 1. Provide food and non-food assistance to crisis-affected people, including refugees living in camps or in transition.
