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FOLLOW-UP TO ECOSOC AND GENERAL ASSEMBLY RESOLUTIONS ON ACTIONS TO BE TAKEN BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARDS OF THE UNITED NATIONS FUNDS AND PROGRAMMES

- Article VI of the World Food Programme General Regulations, adopted by the FAO Conference (Resolution 11/97 of 17 November 1997) and by the United Nations General Assembly (Decision 52/449 of 18 December 1997), specifies the powers and functions of WFP's Executive Board.
- 2. Paragraph 1 of Article VI states: "The Board shall, within the framework of these General Regulations, be responsible for providing intergovernmental support and specific policy direction to and supervision of the activities of WFP in accordance with the overall policy guidance of the General Assembly of the United Nations, the FAO Conference, the Economic and Social Council and the Council of FAO, and for ensuring that WFP is responsive to the needs and priorities of recipient countries. The Board will be subject to the general authority of the Economic and Social Council and the Council of FAO".
- 3. Paragraph 3 indicates the Board's reporting obligations: "The Board shall provide a concise report annually on WFP's programmes, projects and activities including major decisions of the Board to the substantive session of the Economic and Social Council and the Council of FAO".
- 4. In regard to the annual reporting mandates for the operational activities segment of its substantive session, ECOSOC recalled General Assembly resolution 48/162 of 20 December 1993, 50/120 of 20 December 1995, 50/227 of 24 May 1996 and 52/203 of 18 December 1997, and ECOSOC resolutions 1994/33 of 28 July 1994 and 1995/51 of 28 July 1995, and adopted resolution 1998/27 of 28 July 1998—"Reporting of the United Nations funds and programmes to the Economic and Social Council". In this resolution, ECOSOC emphasized the need for more analytical and issue-oriented reporting, focusing on matters arising from implementation of the reform programmes of the Secretary-General.
- 5. In compliance with the above-mentioned and other related resolutions, the Secretariat has prepared the attached chart listing the relevant ECOSOC and General Assembly resolutions. Those paragraphs that call for consideration and follow-up action by Executive Boards of funds and programmes are reproduced for information.
- 6. As requested by the Executive Board in its decision 1999/EB.1/17, the Executive Director will report to the Board at its Annual Session of the year 2002 on follow-up action taken by WFP in compliance with the mandates contained in those resolutions.

				Para.22: Recommends that the practice of holding joint meetings of the Bureaux of the Executive Boards of the United Nations Development Programme and of the United Nations Population Fund, the United Nations Children's Fund and the World Food Programme be continued, with a view to improving the impact of these meetings.
