

What is REACH?

- Established in 2008 by WFP, FAO, UNICEF, and WHO, REACH embodies the spirit of working as 'One UN.'
- REACH is a United Nations initiative that assists governments in countries with high burdens of child and maternal under-nutrition to accelerate the scale-up of food and nutrition actions
- REACH acts as a catalyst to help governments develop capacity through better nutrition governance and management.
- The REACH country approach and resource tools provide guidance for the implementation of multi-sectoral nutrition programming that cuts across government sectors.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

AMONG

THE FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION OF THE UNITED NATIONS (FAO),

THE WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION (WHO),

THE UNITED NATIONS CHILDREN'S FUND (UNICEF),

AND

THE UNITED NATIONS WORLD FOOD PROGRAMME (WFP)

CONCERNING THE HOSTING ARRANGEMENT OF THE REACH PARTNERSHIP

PREAMBLE

The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations ("FAO"), the World Health Organization ("WHO"), the United Nations Children's Fund ("UNICEF, United Nations World Food Programme ("WFP", and together with FAO, WHO and UNICEF, the "Initiating Partners", also collectively referred to as the "Parties") issued a Letter to Country Representatives dated 18 August 2009 that sets forth their commitment to a renewed effort against child hunger and undernutrition ("REACH" or the "Partnership"). REACH builds on the activities and achievements of the Ending Child Hunger and Undernutrition ("ECHUF") initiative and is geared to supporting countries to intensify action through government-led, solution-focessed partnerships involving a broad range of organizations.


The Initiating Partners have jointly established and contributed staff members to an inter-agency team (the "REACH Secretariat"), currently losted by WFP, which assists country-based actors in the promotion of operational synergies and coherence, facilitating the systematic application of successful practices and focused advocacy messages in pursuit of mitrition goals.

Because effective country-level coordination of nutrition programming is essential to addressing childhood undernutrition, at the request of the REACH steering committee (he "Steering Committee", as further described in Article II hereof), WFP has agreed to assist the Partnership in achieving its objectives by hosting the REACH Secretaria for an initial term of three years, subject to the provisions of this Memorandum of Understanding ("MoU") and related agreements between the Parties, and by providing its technical, legal, financial nuanagement, fiduciary and administrative support and facilities. As host agency for REACH, WFP will be addressed as the "Host Agency" under this MoU. Where WFP ceases to host the



REACH Conceptual Framework










UN Nutrition Coordination at the Global Level

REACH: An effective catalyst for scaling up priority nutrition interventions at the country level

Abstract

Background, Renewed Efforts Against Child Hunger (REACH) is the foint United Nations initiative to address Millenniam Development Goal (MDG) 10, Yarget S, i.e., to halve the proportion of underweight children ander S years old by 2015. The United Nations Fiood and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the World Health Organization (WHO), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the World Food Programmer (WFP), and the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IEAD) developed and tested a facilitation mechanism to act as a stability for scaling up multisectoral matrikan activities.

Objective. The UN-REACH partners developed pilot projecti in Mauritania and Lao PDR from 2008 to 2010 and depoyeed facilitators to improve matrition governance and coordination. Review misatoms were conducted in February 2011 to assess the REACH approach and what it achieved.

Methods. The UN review mission members reviewed documents, assessed policy and management indicators, conducted qualitative interviews, and discussed findinge with key stakeholders, including the most senior UN matrition dimetors from all agencies.

Results: Among other UN-REACH achievements, the Prime Minister of Mauritania agreed to preside over a new National Nutrition Development Louncil responsible for high-level decision-making and setting national policy objectives. REACH facilitated the completion of LawS first national Notrition Strategy and Plan of Action and formation of the multistakeholder Nutrition Taek Forze. During the REACH engagement, coordination, joint advocacy, situation analysis, policy development, and joint UN programming for matrition were strengthened in Low PDR and Mauritania.

Background

UN-REACH was jointly established by the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the World Health Organization (WHO), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), and the World Food Programme (WFP) to solve the nutrition needs of the world's most disadvantaged and vulnerable children and women. Recognizing that this would require a multisectoral approach, these UN agencies-later joined by the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD)-agreed to set up a joint mechanism to ensure that the UN system at the country level would be able to jointly support better-coordinated efforts to end hunger and undernutrition. It was also recognized that effective interventions to address these problems already existed and that by focusing investments on an equity-based approach to development, the world will meet the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) faster and more cost-effectively. Reducing malnutrition among the world's most vulnerable children prevents irreversible damage to human development and helps achieve the goal of halving extreme poverty and hunger as well as the MDGs related to child mortality, maternal health, primary education, and gender equality, and will make significant contributions to all the remaining MDGs.
