

WFP envisions a world where everyone has equal opportunities, equal access to resources, and an equal voice in the decisions that shape their lives, including as individuals within households, communities and societies.

Food for Thought:

- In 2022, 691 to 783 million people in the world faced hunger
- Worldwide, food insecurity disproportionately affects women and people living in rural areas
- Food insecurity remains more prevalent among adult women than men in every region of the world

Gender Equality, Food Security & Nutrition: Context



The Status of Women in Agrifood Systems

- Closing the gender gap in farm productivity and wage gap in agrifood systems would increase global GDP by 1% (nearly USD 1 trillion), and reduce the number of food-insecure people by 45 million
- Women earn 18.4% less than men in agriculture
- Women spend 4.2 hours per day on unpaid domestic care work, whereas men spend 1.9 hours per day




Gender Equality, Food Security & Nutrition: Context

The State of Food Security and Nutrition in the World 2023


In 2022, 27.8 percent of adult women were moderately or severely food insecure, compared with 25.4 percent of men (proportion: 10.6% women; 9.5% men)

Suggested gender responsive recommendations:

- Design gender-sensitive wholesale market infrastructure to improve supply and food safety compliance
- Build gender-sensitive transportation infrastructure to address mobility and market access barriers
- Include women's empowerment strategies in food system policies and programmes to improve access to nutritious foods and household nutrition outcomes
- Ensure equitable access to digital technologies to improve production and competitiveness



Gender Equality, Food Security & Nutrition: Context



2022 Global Food 50/50 Report

- Gender and geographic diversity are severely lacking in the boards of major global food organizations. Across 24 organizations and 351 board seats, 3% of seats are held by nationals of low-income countries
- 2% of board seats are occupied by women from low-income countries
- 40% of board seats are held by women



PROGRAMMING EXAMPLES AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR COLLABORATION



SAVING LIVES CHANGING LIVES

Cash-Based Transfers

- 2023 Cash Policy: effectively and efficiently supporting people to meet food, nutrition, and other essential needs
- Focusing on sending cash to women the largest part of the world's poor – as women's economic empowerment could lift hundreds of millions out of poverty by adding trillions to the global economy
- In Uganda, WFP partnered with the National Bank to conduct an analysis of the barriers preventing women's use of financial services, leading to a focus on increasing the # of women with bank or mobile money account



Climate Change

- Women and girls are disproportionately affected by extreme weather, exacerbating pre-existing inequalities
- Women's participation in resilience programming is crucial to enhance adaptability, capability and independence
- In Guatemala, WFP provides climate risk insurance to indigenous women thereby increasing their capacity to plan for and manage climate related shocks



Food Systems and Resilience

WFP's SAMS programmes promote gender equality and women's economic empowerment through gender transformative agricultural value chain approaches

- Mastercard Foundation partnership: strengthening local food systems, reducing post-harvest losses and boosting access to markets and jobs along the value chain
- Rockefeller Foundation partnership: improving diet quality, sustainability of food systems and rural economic impact through school meal programmes
- Food System Summit's Coalition on Making Food Systems Work for Women and Girls: addressing social norms that influence women's participation, decision-making, voice and agency in local food system strengthening



Emergency Response and Preparedness

Unequal Access - Gendered Barriers to Humanitarian Assistance: common barriers and risks faced by crisisaffected populations

- Key findings before provision of assistance:
 Marginalization/discrimination, low literacy, mobile
 connectivity and ownership, lack of time for carers,
 lack of ID, avoiding military service
- Key findings during provision of assistance: Insecurity, gender-based violence, remoteness
- Key findings after provision of assistance:
 Stigmatization/discrimination, gender-based violence, assistance allocation in polygamous households



Nutrition

- Integrating a gender-transformative focus for lasting impact such as social and behaviour change sessions involving women, men, girls and boys
- Using nutrition sensitive programming to support women's livelihood development and leadership
- Through nutrition programming, WFP promotes timesaving technologies that improve livelihoods, reduce the burden of unpaid work and facilitate equitable access to and control over food security and nutrition, e.g. digital and financial inclusion to improve access to information.



School-Based Programming

Providing nutrition school meals, cash incentives and tailored support to schools:

- Addresses barriers to the continuous learning of both boys and girls
- Examines school norms and structural barriers related to human capital development
- Improves health and education outcomes through improved nutrition
- Provides linkages between small holder farmers, especially women, to markets, supply chains assets, information, technologies and credit through the homegrown school meals programme



Joint Programme: Gender Transformative Approaches (JP-GTA)

Contributing to Zero Hunger by addressing the root causes of gender inequalities

Countries of Implementation: Ecuador and Malawi

Funded by the European Union in collaboration with the RBAs

In 2022:

- Supported over 70 capacity building workshops
- Reached over 70,000 people
- Produced 16 publications, newsletters and knowledge products



Joint Programme: Rural Women's Economic Empowerment (JP-RWEE)

Tackling barriers to gender equality and rural women's empowerment

Funded by Norway, Sweden and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation


Phase two ongoing in Nepal, Niger, the Pacific Islands, Rwanda, Tanzania and Tunisia

- 65,000 female and 15,000 male participants reached to date
- Female agricultural yields increased 82%
- US\$3.6 million income generated
- **US\$6.5 million funding shortfall** (Nepal, Niger, the Pacific Islands, Tanzania and Tunisia)



Gender-Based Violence (GBV)

- Enhanced gender-based violence technical capacities in the Gender Equality Office, focusing on:
- Gender analyses: better analysis and use of data to strengthen Country Strategic Plans
- **Gender in emergencies:** more intentional gendered humanitarian responses are required
- **Gender and access:** specific recommendations will be developed with country offices as part two of the study *Unequal Access: Gendered Barriers to Humanitarian Assistance*



Breaking Barriers To Girls' Education

Joint programme: WFP, UNFPA, UNICEF

Funded by Global Affairs Canada

Currently in Chad and Niger with significant potential for scale and replicability. Beneficiaries: 130,450 (36,000 Chad, 94,450 Niger)

Responds to:

- High levels of poverty, vulnerability and fragility in Chad and Niger with a focus on displaced populations and humanitarian needs;
- Limited awareness and understanding of sexual and reproductive health rights, and a lack of gender-based violence awareness;
- Nutrition, WASH and health needs of adolescent girls, aiming to ensure they are healthy and well-nourished in school.



Regional Gender Implementation Strategy - RBB

- Strengthening people-centered data and analysis to inform
- More people-centered programme design and delivery, and in turn, contribute to learning
- Influencing more inclusive social protection systems



Regional Gender Implementation Strategy - RBC

Focus Areas: Emergencies, Social protection, Climate change and water scarcity, GE, Disability Inclusion, Youth, Refugee resilience

Key actions:

- Evidence generation and knowledge management
- Capacity strengthening within country offices and partners
- Piloting the UN Women gendersensitive resilience capacity index with UN Women



Regional Gender Implementation Strategy - RBD

Focus areas: Emergencies, Social protection, School feeding, Resilience-building, Digital and financial inclusion

Analysis and use of disaggregated data and enhanced evidence generation:

- SODEXO in Benin, the Gambia, Liberia and Sierra Leone

 focused on sustainable food systems and strengthened
 value chains
- Rockefeller Foundation in Benin and Ghana focused on food fortification and the associated downstream supply chains



Regional implementation strategy - RBJ

- Developing and validating a corporate gender budgeting and expenditure tracking framework
- Engaging with system strengthening via enhanced government policy dialogue towards genderresponsive food systems
- Ensuring concerted and practical actions that address root causes of gender inequalities through enhanced partnerships with local and grassroot partnerships alongside modernizing agriculture to attract youth
- Embedding gender equality and women's empowerment in Country Strategic Plans
- Replicating rural transformation programmes and collaborate on anticipatory action mapping



Regional Gender Implementation Strategy - RBN

Key areas of focus:

- Gender-inclusive value chain analysis and development (MasterCard Foundation)
- Climate change and water scarcity, with strong collaboration with RBJ
- Advancing gender transformative approaches (Somalia CO has demonstrated a strong commitment by recruiting 7 gender advisors to deliver on commitments)



Regional Gender Implementation Strategy - RBP

Key areas of focus:

- Employment Bolivia, Guatemala, Haiti, Venezuela
- Emergencies, disaster risk reduction and preparedness – Bolivia, Cuba, Honduras
- Local women's organizations Bolivia, Nicaragua, Peru
- The redistribution of care work ECLAC alignment (regional)
- Food systems Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras (specifically linking women producer organizations to markets, including financial inclusion)
