<p><b>International Day of Persons with Disabilities</b></p>	<p>In 2020 The World Food Programme was the recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, in recognition of “its efforts to combat hunger, for its contribution to bettering conditions for peace in conflict-affected areas and for acting as a driving force in efforts to prevent the use of hunger as a weapon of war and conflict”. Achieving Zero Hunger and tackling these ambitious goals requires inclusion of persons with disabilities, the world’s largest minority group.</p> <p>The research collaboration between Trinity College Dublin (TCD) and WFP seeks to develop an evidence base for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in food security programming. <p><b>Panel:</b> <i>Humanitarian Access and Gender-based violence in conflict</i></p>	<p>Conflict is one of the factors that has increased both food insecurity and gender-based violence globally. We know that women's participation in important decision-making processes, such as emergency frameworks and peace processes, is necessary in order to achieve gender equality and reduce gender-based violence. In some places of conflict, humanitarian access has been limited or blocked, increasing the risk of instances of gender-based violence within that area.
