TRANSPORT, STORAGE AND PACKAGING AS MOST SIGNIFICANT CAUSES OF POST-DELIVERY LOSSES

IMPROPER or OVERLONG STORAGE

RECONSTITUTION, **REBAGGING, or REPACKING**

Quantity: **3,645 MT 0.06%** of total food handled **21%** of total post-delivery losses



HOW DO WE MITIGATE THEM



STORAGE

- Face-to-face training for supply chain employees on best practices;
- Inclusion of best-before dates in daily stock reports and analysis of stock rotations.



TRANSPORT

- Inner protective materials and bindings applied to minimize damage during transport;
- and shipping processes.



PACKAGING

- breakage;
- Assessment of local standards by the Food Safety and Quality Assurance Branch.



• Adequate fumigation during shipping, reducing the risk of live insects arriving at destination; Appointment of a third party to monitor and supervise loading procedures to identify any gaps in tallying, transport

• Appointment of inspection companies to enhance checks on empty bags at discharge ports, reducing the risk of bag
